"CAPTAIN'S CORNER"

Night cruising is a challenge, and lights can be confusing until you learn some simple patterns. Let's test your knowledge of navigation lights.

- 1. You see a white light above and slightly behind a red light off your starboard bow. As you watch, the red light disappears and a second white light appears below and slightly behind the first. What is it?
 - a. A red navigational aid on the starboard side of the channel
 - b. A hazard marker just to your right
 - c. A boat passing across your bow from the starboard, moving away
 - d. A boat with a short-circuit in its navigation lights
- 2. You approach what you believe to be a river entrance and see a white light flashing one short and one long signal. What are you looking at?
 - a. A safe water navigational aid in the center of the channel
 - b. You are approaching a vessel's stern
 - c. A hazard marker warning of shallow water
 - d. Most likely a warning light on a shore-based tower
- 3. As you continue up river, you spot a green beacon flashing two quick, a short pause, one quick, then a long pause. What are you looking at?
 - a. Another boat passing across your bow from the port side
 - b. A green navigational aid on the starboard side of the channel
 - c. A preferred channel marker indicating the main channel is to the right
 - d. A traffic light onshore

We used to frequently participate in national and district public relations contests. The Commander's Cup was for the best audiovideo on a subject selected by the committee. Ah, the best laid plans... We'd planned to conduct both Piloting and Advanced Piloting (AP) this season. But, alas, fate dictates that we hold AP off until next season. Both courses have been re-worked from the ground up this year and both arrived late to the Squadrons. Piloting arrived only twelve days ahead of our start date, but the instructors were able to stay a week or so ahead of the class in terms of content and instructional material. And to the credit of the students, all who took the exam passed.

Unfortunately AP arrived five weeks late. This created serious logistical problems. We have only so many instructors and three sets of computers/projectors. Our only option was to run AP at the same time as Seamanship and Weather. This would have reduced attendance significantly. So we've opted to cancel AP this year and offer it again next winter after another Piloting Course. We'll announce the 2005/2006 schedule in the fall.

NVSPS built a GPS course two years ago and we've given it very successfully on a number of occasions. It was designed to give a two and a half hour overview of what GPS is and how it works, and a detailed discussion on the GPS units typically used by pleasure boaters today. It walks though the setup of your GPS unit and what each of the screens are displaying, and it highlights what GPS can and cannot do for the boater. This course is free and is often used to recruit new members when we conduct it at marinas and boating stores. We've had several members ask about this NVSPS GPS course, so if there is sufficient interest (half a dozen or more folks), we 'd be happy to run this course on a Wednesday evening. A Shared Breakfast at Anchor

In my early days of Chesapeake sailing, I enjoyed sailing in the winter in a 22-footer. I was always by myself, since finding crew in cold weather was difficult. I had a small outboard in the lazarette but it almost never worked, so I depended on sails to get in and out of port. Frequently thin sheets of ice lay on the calm waters of the small estuaries. One January I was anchored in Sillery Bay west of Gibson Island in an open portion of the Magothy River. The water was calm, but it would not freeze overnight as it might in Gibson Harbor past the narrows. I looked forward to a Sunday breakfast of my favorite French omelet and some leftover white wine while watching the wintering water foul so plentiful in the bay.

All was quiet before sunrise; there was no ice. By the time I got dressed in my heavy warm hunting gear and set breakfast in the cockpit, ducks were everywhere and organized after being separated in the night. A glint of orange from the rising sun brought no warmth. A large flock of mostly canvasbacks, were huddled together away from shore. Through my binoculars I identified a solitary pied-billed grebe diving near the shore. It popped up after awhile, empty beaked, and I noticed a large herring gull paddling towards it. The grebe dove and came up further away from the shore and toward the rafting flock of ducks. Again and again the gull approached and the grebe dove. I thought how clever, the gull will abscond with any fish the grebe catches, a technique common to gulls. I was captivated, and I noticed two other things: the distance between grebe and gull was narrowing and the grebe always headed toward the raft of ducks.

What actually was going on? The gull became more aggressive. The grebe was tiring; its time under water shortened and the distance between dives decreased. As they approached, the raft of ducks parted giving ground (water) to the desperate grebe and ever pursuing gull. The prize was not to be fish, but the grebe itself! Eventually the grebe could not dive another time; the gull lunged, caught its pray by the neck and held it underwater. The grebe's wings gave a final flutter and it was over. I took a breath, the first for what seemed like many minutes. My omelet, half finished, was cold now.

Feathers were everywhere as the gull stripped its flesh. Of course this attracted more gulls and within a few minutes all that remained were wings and a few feathers floating on the calm water. The two groups of ducks stayed away; it looked as if they had known the gull's intention and, not wanting to take the grebe's place, kept moving away as he desperately sought safety in their numbers.

There was nothing the grebe could have done as soon as this tactic was chosen. The grebe's habit of diving instead of flying away for protection did it in. Each dive made it weaker and less

able to fly. The gull knew it was inevitable and had probably done this many times before. The grebe knew it too. The moment I took my mind off the fish and focused on the grebe I had a sickening feeling of helplessness, of inevitability; the grebe had no way out.

A lesson from nature on selecting our own courses of action, I thought.

"The Flaming Ship of Ocracoke and Other Tales of the Outer Banks"

by Charles Harry Whedbee John F. Blair Publisher, Winston-Salem, NC, 1971.

I picked up this book because of the title while we were on our way to our annual week at the Outer Banks. The author, in a mood to try to preserve the lore of the Outer Banks, starts his collection of short stories with a Foreword:

"In those golden years before civilization had too much touched the North Carolina Outer Banks, there existed on these ocean shores a sort of latter-day Garden of Eden of sun, sea, and sand."

His stories are varied and give you a whole new insight to the tourist-laden area. For example, the story "Pin Hill" tells how the hill just south of Jockey Ridge got its name from the many sewing pins found in the sand. He supplies the myth of how those pins came to be, and why they still appear after all these years.

His title story is about the passage of migrating English colonists and the former pirate who captained their ship. His greed-motivated dastardly attack on them and the resulting irony of his ship's burning are laid out in polite but complete detail. It is said that this tale repeats every year on the night of the first new moon in September off the shores of Ocracoke. We vacation in October, so I can't say from first-hand observation how true this is.

Mr. Whedbee's earlier books capture the same sort of lore: "Legends of the Outer Banks", "Outer Banks Mysteries", "Stories of the Outer Banks", "Seaside Stories", and "Outer Banks Tales to Remember". I have not read them, but by the titles alone, you can tell that those shores have lots to tell.
