# The Sailor's Experience

#### LAND LOCKED - CHARTER BOUND THE IN TRIM YEARS - PART II

Lightning was all around; the thunder was shattering. As we were finishing dinner a determined rain began. I saw a sailboat light come from around Deepwater Point headed directly at us; toward the entrance to St Michaels. "Admiral, look at this; That boat can not come directly toward the entrance, there are only two feet of water" Sure enough it was soon sitting still. The radio was on: "Boat rounding the red buoy into St Michaels, this is Ragtime, can you give us assistance?" No answer. It was my turn on the radio.

"Ragtime, this is Osprey. The boat entering is a Naval Academy training vessel and would not be able to assist even if they heard you; what do you need? A long pause... "Olives." I felt a challenge arising, "I'll be right over."

While Jacque was finding the olives, I donned yellow slicker and boots. All I heard as I left the cabin besides earth shaking thunder was "What are you doing?" Once on deck it was chaos. Lightning three or more times a minute followed by blasting thunder. I headed out the entrance toward Ragtime's dim lights. Only the lightning made navigation possible. I had some apprehension about that lightning, but the challenge was on. Soon I could make out a red hull and then voices, "He's here----he has the olives". The whole situation now became apparent. The skipper was very inexperienced; there were four families on board (two babies, several teenagers) who knew even less than he. They had been drinking for some time and had to search for the charts when I asked for them. "You needed to pass the red flashing buoy "4" to starboard before turning in. Red right returning."

Kedging was the only option I could think of as she was fast in the sand. I rounded up the teenagers and got them in the dingy. "Row out to the channel, drop anchor and row back" fortunately they had been drinking coke. Ragtime was a 46' sloop with an anchor wench. With a little help from the engin, we reached the channel where I guided her into the harbor. What now? All moorings had been taken hours before. The skipper suggested Ragtime raft with Osprey--how convenient.

Once securely attached, the party continued. Our crew settled comfortably in the lounge of Ragtime. Food and drinks were everywhere. Teenagers were playing music as loud as possible, eight-year-old's were running around, babies were crying, and the adults were talking, laughing, and drinking. The party went on all night, but not for me. On board the relatively quiet Osprey I reflected on the days events. A blistering sail at full speed from the Sassafras to St Michaels well within the limits of daylight. A rescue of a swamped sailboat in the middle of the Chesapeake. A rescue of a grounded sailboat with babies and young children aboard, the skipper under prepared, under conditioned and under the weather.

It was a day of sailing I'll never forget. I drifted off to sleep remembering the six-week Bahamas sail on Sid's Hinckley Bermuda Forty. Blue water sailing is still in my veins but where and how can I charter a seaworthy boat? I must visit Southwest Harbor and the Hinkley Boat Yard. They have a variety of elegant safe blue water sailboats from 30' to 50' and a chartering service if one can meet their standards. We made the call and received applications. Filling them out was fun, as past experiences were requested. This was years before I heard of USPS, piloting, rules of the road, or many safety requirements; they were not a strong concern of mine at the time; blue water sailing was. Another challenging charter next.






