We had the greatest percent increase in completions of advanced courses, (Seamanship, Piloting, and AP) for the 1st place trophy. And we placed 3rd for the Henry E. Sweet Trophy for Excellence in Education for both the Advanced and Elective courses. Individually, D5 formally congratulated Lt Robert Van Buskirk, P, with a certificate recognizing him as the NVSPS nominee for the Charles F. Chapman Excellence in Teaching Award for 2007. Bob Cox, AP, Lew Miller, AP; Lt Tom Ballew, AP; Lt Joe Jarocki, AP, and Lt Steve Shupack, AP, received Educational Proficiency Awards. This award recognizes members holding the grade of AP who complete any 3 elective courses. There's a special uniform insignia for recipients. Cdr Jay Nelson presented the awards to the squadron at our November All Hands' Meeting.

How do you earn the Educational Proficiency Award? Start by registering now for the winter offerings. Should you fill your fuel tanks for the winter?

Filling fuel tanks or not during the winter is widely debated by boaters each year, usually the participants simply agree to disagree.

- The argument for: As temperatures rise and fall during the winter, condensation causes water to develop.
 Filling the tanks minimizes air vapor and does not allow condensation to occur.
- The argument against: Condensation in fuel tanks is nonsense. And if you let fuel sit over the winter, it loses octane and your boat will under perform in the spring until it runs through the first tank of fuel.

If you strip away the emotion and do the math, a 200-gal tank has a volume of just over 0.76 cubic meter. The amount of water vapor in air is extremely small, even at 100% humidity. Depending on the temperature of the air, a cubic meter of air holds between 10 and 30 grams of water (17°- 85° F). The temperature in Washington during the winter averages 26.3° F (day 32.5°, evening 19.8°).

At 26° F, the amount of water suspended in the air in a completely empty 200 gallon tank is roughly 9 grams. A fluid ounce of water is 28.5 grams. So we're talking about less than a third of an ounce of water suspended in the air inside the tank (200 gallon tank = 0.76 cubic meter of volume, 12 grams of water suspended at $26.3^{\circ} = .76 *12$ grams). Let's assume we will express one third of this water volume (3 grams) into the tank through condensation a dozen times during the course of the winter (more on this in a minute). This would add less than 1.25 ounces of water to a 200 gallon tank, or if you prefer, the water added would be 0.005% of the total volume of the tank. If the tank is half full, the effect is mitigated to less than 0.7 ounce of water. That small amount of water is not going to cause engine performance problems.

OK, so why can't you express more of the suspended water than one third of the volume of air, if that much? The reason is simpler than you think. Conditions in a winterized boat are not ideal for condensation because the whole boat is cold. For the same reason condensation does not occur on a glass of water at room temperature, regardless of the temperature of the room, condensation won't occur in the tank unless the air temperature inside the tank is significantly different from outside. Tempera-

tures rise and fall slowly over the course of the day. Further, the air temperature changes inside the bilge are less severe and lag behind the outside air temperature. The comparatively minor temperature changes are quickly transferred to the air/fuel inside the tank. The result is the temperature difference inside and outside the tank remains small.

I've told everyone who will listen that I'm not a big fan of E-10 gasoline for boats. The ethanol suspends water in fuel that normally sinks to the bottom of the tank. The water suspended in the E-10 fuel from condensation in the tank is just too small to cause engine problems, but water contamination in fuel from other sources is another issue. Water can get into fuel from leaking deck fittings on your boat or the filler caps on the marina fuel storage tanks. These sources can result in significant amounts of water in your tank. Suspended by E-10 gasoline and therefore not filtered out with a water separator, this will cause performance and maintenance problems.



I fill my tanks each winter, but I can't explain why!

Perhaps I fill my tanks because I see this as an expense I will not run into in the spring. Maybe it's a personal sense that I like to leave the boat ready to open the sea cocks and turn the key – although if you saw my spring commissioning checklist you'd know this is far from reality. More likely, it is because this was the conventional wisdom many years ago when I started boating and old habits die hard. Bottom line: as long as you add stabilizer to the fuel in the tank, it doesn't really matter what level your tanks are over the winter. Now, don't you wish that was my opening sentence?

We have to say that this trip from Stuart, FL to Herrington Harbour South, MD was very different from our follies in the Pacific Northwest last year, and still offered us many new experiences and learning situations. We experienced "skinny water", piloting in narrow channels, steering a "crabbing boat" (in a narrow channel!), surviving a boarding/inspection by the "water police", docking with current, and many different types of bridges and bridge openings (even more fun with current and other boats!). There were tight passing situations (huge barges!), "crab fishing" at anchor, two offshore passages, and navigation ranges (front and back). We had to rent a car in Stuart for one day so we had a ride back from the rental car drop off location in Jupiter, FL. Then we had to return the Stuart rental car and get a ride back to the boat! Whew! Confusing and time consuming, but we were finally off and moving up the ICW.

Again, we coerced Robin and Jim Roberts to accompany us on this trip and they happily agreed; it must have been the hope and anticipation of Clara offering freshly baked cookies every afternoon! Now I must say that Sea Waltz performed very well and we are becoming even more impressed with our Krogen.



A big "Thank-You!" to Robin and Jim who gave us great nautical pointers, kept us in stitches from laughter, found great anchorages, let us stumble at times and, as usual, raised our confidence in our own abilities. Of course, we also let them pilot the boat too (no, this picture of Jim and Robin wasn't staged; they were actually piloting the boat)!

My personal "hats' off" and a BIG THANK-YOU to Clara who did a great job. She piloted Sea Waltz through a majority of the shallow water

areas, determined where to drop the hook in anchorages, negotiated bridges, docked, ran inlets (she's pictured here running outbound from Wrightsville Beach, NC), and, especially, for piloting while Sea Waltz was "crabbing" about 14 degrees due to current with 35 knot beam winds as we crossed the Alligator River. As usual, and in addition to the great daily assortment of freshly baked cookies, Clara planned and executed a series of wonderfully prepared meals that kept us all begging for more (when's that cookbook going to be published?).


