

## Curmudgeon

Lord, keep your arm around my shoulder and, Your hand over my mouth.





Picture this: The day starts out beautifully with only a small chance of thunderstorms. Everyone on board is enjoying another gorgeous, sunny day on the Bay. Suddenly, a dark cloud appears in the western sky. Within moments, it's not as far away as first thought. The wind picks up from a mild breeze to 25 knots in a matter of minutes. The sky is dark, the rain starts coming down in buckets and the chop in the water has turned to five foot waves. You cannot make it to a port before the storm hits. You start thinking about options but there are few.

No one in their right mind embarks on a cruise without first checking the weather. But what happens if you are already out there and heavy weather suddenly comes upon you? To get the answer, I went to our resident authority on all things weather related – John Shivik. John teaches the USPS weather course as well as the weather seminar. The former is an intense, four month examination of the weather; the latter is a 2.5 hour review of the salient things to know about reading the sky and cloud formations to anticipate the weather coming at you.

Despite the fact that your local weather forecaster on TV frequently gets it wrong, our weather is predictable to a large extent. Today's technology allows climatologists to see the movement of winds and fronts and to identify patterns that are highly predictive of the weather. But no matter how sophisticated we become at this, the fact is that the variables that make up our weather are so intense and highly changeable that it behooves all sailors to learn how to read the sky for themselves.

Observation is the key. You must be aware of changes in temperature, dew point, wind direction, and air pressure. Perhaps most important for boaters in our area is the formation of clouds and what they mean. Your "weather-eye" should be keenly aware of clouds that form suddenly, especially from the west, that are dark, billowing and vertically developing. That most certainly means a thunderstorm, with lightning possible, is forming close enough to you that you should take action to ensure your safety. Bear in mind that a thunderstorm can travel as fast as 70 mph. The cloud that seems to be miles away could literally be upon you in minutes.

If this happens and you are unable to get to a safe port, prepare by having all on board put on their life jackets. Secure all equipment and gear to avoid being injured by objects that can be tossed around in high winds and heavy seas. Keep away from metal as much as possible and seek shelter inside your cabin.

We hope you never face bad weather in your excursions but we all know that it is likely you will. What can you do? Take our weather courses to better prepare yourself for the inevitable. Also, visit <a href="http://www.erh.noaa.gov/lwx/">http://www.erh.noaa.gov/lwx/</a> and learn how to use the tools there to help you better read the sky above you. Most of all have a plan for bad weather and make sure your crew knows what is expected of them if you encounter heavy weather.

Have a wonderful and safe boating season.

**Subject: Correction of Administrative Error --- Nominating Committee Composition** 

In accordance with the Northern Virginia Sail & Power Squadron By-Laws dated 31 October 2008, Section 6.7.7, the Executive Committee requests correction of an administrative error. Hence, this correction published in the *of Tars and Terns* allows the membership to be informed in advance of a vote on the correction to the 2011-2012 Nominating Committee composition.

Preface: Elected Committees, Section 5.5 NVSPS By-Laws states:

There shall be a Nominating Committee, consisting of *six* members, *two* of whom shall be elected annually by the active members at the annual meeting *for a term* of three years. The Chair shall be elected annually by the Committee members in accordance with Section 5.1.6. (Italics added.)

History: The Nominating Committee by letter of 13 December 2010, to the NVSPS Membership, submitted a proposed roster for the 2011-2012 Bridge, Rules Committee, Auditing Committee, Executive Committee and Nominating Committee. That roster was duly presented to the membership and the nominees were elected.

Issue: Nominating Committee's 13 Dec10 letter erroneously listed for the 2011-12 Nominating Committee composition seven members and it listed five members with one year terms and two with two year terms, all contrary to NVSPS By-Laws Section 5.5. This error is the result of the 2009 – 2010 NOMCOM action.


